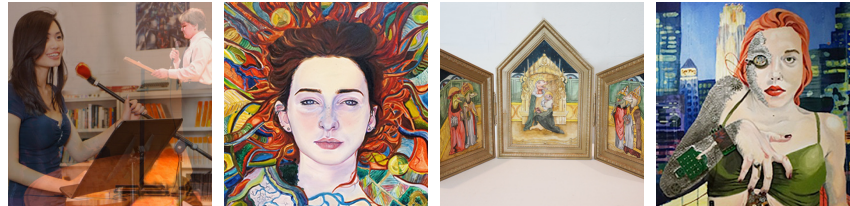

## **The results are in and Perpich rocks MN Scholastic Arts & Writing Awards**

The results of the 2015 Minnesota Scholastic Arts & Writing Awards judging are in and Perpich students have once more put Perpich Arts High School among the top award-winning schools in Minnesota with 74 awards. Perpich media and visual arts students have won 18 Gold Keys, 12 Silver Keys and 33 honorable mentions. On top of that, with 11 awards in the writing competition, Perpich ranks second overall and first among public high schools in Minnesota.

Halley Boesen, junior in visual arts, has been named an American Visions nominee, one of only five in the state. This makes her eligible for a scholarship from the member schools of the Association of Independent Colleges of Art & Design.

In poetry, Perpich took two Silver Keys, one for Erika Beal, senior in literary arts and one for Marie (Anna) Thoraldson, who was a junior in literary arts. Erika also received a Silver Key in the short story category. Jansen Pierce, junior in literary arts, won a Silver Key for flash fiction. Valentina Grondhuis, junior in literary arts, won a Silver Key for personal essay/memoir.

Winning honorable mentions are junior literary arts students Anne Boatman, short story; Andrei Haberer, poetry; Katia Kozachok, poetry; Kayla McBride, poetry; Cole Velders, personal essay/memoir; and Jane Gadbois, visual arts senior, for poetry. Congratulations! Each of you makes Perpich proud!



### Music students win accolades

Riona Ryan, Thanasi Pantazides, Sam Hoch and Cynthia Heck, all seniors in the music program, have won recognition in two different Minnesota music competitions.

Riona Ryan has won the **Eric Stokes Song Contest**. She will receive a cash prize and a performance of her piece in March by the Zeitgeist New Music Ensemble. The contest was developed to encourage and celebrate amateur music-making and attracts 50 to 70 entries per year. Entrants have ranged in age from four to 89 and are judged in two categories, youth (up to age 17) and adult.



Cynthia Heck, Sam Hoch and Thanasi Pantazides are three of only five composer finalists in the **Minnesota Varsity Competition**, sponsored by Minnesota Public Radio. They will each receive a video focus on the MPR website. Their compositions will be read along with the two other finalists Feb. 14. Two winners will be featured in a live on-air concert from the Fitzgerald Theatre April 19. Winners also receive scholarships of \$4000 to certain schools. Minnesota Varsity showcases the top high school musical talent from MPR's broadcast area. Congratulations to our terrific music students!

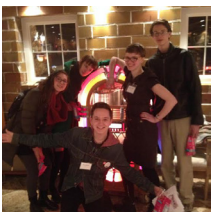
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### Dance alumni doing well

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### Design students are growing greener and greener

On Feb. 5, five design students, Amanda Erickson, Olivia Munson, Naomi Green, Josh Mickelson, Helena Smith and Eliot Skinner, participated in the Minnesota Cup's Entrepreneurs At the Table, Growing the Food Innovation Network in MN event at the Green Acres Event Center in Eden Prairie. Students mixed with Minnesota investors and entrepreneurs to talk about the research and development of their "micGrow: a green space" design, which incorporates micro-gardens and hydroponics into cafeteria tables and booths to educate students on the benefits of healthy eating and the greens food cycle. Here is the pitch they presented to the investors at the show: "Public school students have very limited accessibility to fresh vegetables. The "micGrow: a green space" will provide fresh herbs, leafy greens and sprouts to enhance students' meals. This green space will add to a cafeteria's aesthetic value, creating a welcoming and beautiful space for students to eat. There is also a therapeutic element to "micGrow: a green space" because human beings are naturally connected to plants and micGrow will promote the well-being of all students. Interacting with such a vibrantly alive food source will create a culture where students consider and analyze where their food comes from. "micGrow: a green space" is in the R&D stages by design students."



### The Empty Bowls Project returns to Perpich

The Empty Bowls Project is an international grassroots effort to raise both money and awareness in the fight to end hunger. The ceramics department at Perpich and the Empty Bowls Project in the Robbinsdale school district collaborate to create bowls to be sold with proceeds go to food shelves in the area.
