New faces and familiar faces in new roles at Perpich and Crosswinds

Now that the 2014 legislature made it official that Crosswinds Arts and Science School in Woodbury is part of Perpich Center for Arts Education, personnel shifts have proceeded to make sure both Crosswinds and the arts high school are fully staffed.

Antwan Harris, who has been principal at the arts high school for one year, now will also serve as principal over Crosswinds. **Carla Hines**, principal at Crosswinds last year, now heads the new Crosswinds teacher institute and the agency's outreach group that provides professional development and curricular and assessment models to schools in Minnesota.

Following the retirement of Nancy Bundy, founding media arts instructor, last spring, **Rebecca Bullen**, former Perpich media arts instructor who spent the last year heading the arts program at Crosswinds, returns to head the arts high school media arts program.

Joshua Clausen is the new electronic music instructor in the music program. Clausen is a Minneapolis-based composer, music producer and educator. He is a co-founder of Slam Academy, a small business dedicated to community education in the electronic arts. Clausen has composed works for the Renegade Ensemble, the Antithesis Project, AVIDduo, Keith Kirchoff and Kyle Hutchins and has recently been awarded commissioning grants from the Jerome Foundation and MacPhail Center for Music. Clausen's work has been presented at numerous festivals and conferences of new music including the International Computer Music Conference, Society for Electroacoustic Music in the United States, New York City Electroacoustic Music Festival, Electronic Music Midwest and the Spark festival. Clausen earned a B.M. (theory) and M.A. (composition) degrees from Concordia College and the University of Minnesota, respectively.

Visual arts instructor awarded at Four Points Contemporary Biannual

Pat Benincasa's work, "Stelco, Hamilton Ontario," received an Award of Excellence at **Four Points Contemporary's 3rd Biannual Competition**. The juror was Falavia Cosma, executive director at International Writers' and Artists' Residency in Val David, Quebec, Canada. Benincasa's work is part of a series about place as memory and the focus is on magnificent work sites that for the most part have been demolished or abandoned—but not forgotten. Submissions were received from approximately 260 entries globally. This competition showcases a wide variety of styles and mediums of more than 50 visual artists from different parts of the world.

Benincasa also had another piece, "Ore Yard Pennsylvania," accepted in the 2014 Art Kudos International Exhibition, an online juried competition in its tenth year. The juror was Graeme Reid, director of collections and exhibitions at the Museum of Wisconsin Art. The show includes 156 artists representing 39 countries.

In the morning, students will attend panel presentations of their choice. Each panel will feature two college representatives with 25 minutes each to present, focusing on careers that students may pursue based on the school's majors with student/alumni examples. Presenters will address the vital role of art and design in a global community, along with the culture and economy students are going to face and how they will prepare them.

The afternoon is for students to show their portfolios. Each visiting school will have a station at which seniors can show their portfolios for comments on readiness, critiques, suggestions for application process and scholarship information. Juniors will receive brief portfolio feedback, suggestions about college readiness as demonstrated in their work and information about precollege summer programs.


Math teacher is international athlete

What we did on our summer vacations

Gabby Abram, Jessika Akpaka and Liam McLaughlin, all seniors in dance, received scholarships for Arena Dances 2014 Summer Dance Intensive. The dancers took classes and learned repertory with members of the professional dance company Arena Dances under the direction of Mathew Janczewski at the Cowles Center in June.

Behavioral artist and Perpich media arts instructor **Aki Shibata**, who said dancing in public is a joyful act, participated in a “Don’t You Feel It Too?” session in downtown Minneapolis in July. “Don’t You Feel It Too?” asked individuals to dance (with no audible music) on Nicollet Mall. The event was created by behavioral artist Marcus Young. Young, the public artist in residence for the city of St. Paul, has also created projects such as St. Paul’s sidewalk poetry competition, a kite-carried wish-making festival on Harriet Island and a Northern Spark sleepover event at the Walker Art Center called the Lullaby Experiment.

Avery Ellis, senior in media arts, was “working intensely” on his summer projects for media, and worked as the props assistant on a new film, “The King’s Rook,” in L.A.

Audrey Beyer, senior in music, was accepted to attend the Minnesota Opera’s summer opera camp in Faribault. Teen vocalists from throughout the United States audition to attend the camp.

Barbara Morin, theater instructor, traveled with visual arts emerita instructor Karen Monson to Spring Green, Wis. to tour the Frank Lloyd Wright estate, Taliesin. The landscape and the house are breathtakingly beautiful. She read a book about the Taliesin Fellowship, an apprenticeship program run by Wright—the gist of which was he wasn’t a very nice man, but he made really innovative stuff. Over the summer Morin also bought and began learning how to refurbish and maintain two vintage Singer sewing machines—a 66-18 from 1941 and a 15-91 from 1955.

Sophie Finnerty, senior in theater, was stage manager for a production of “Hamlet” in Vermont. The production used the entire theater as its stage.

Tory Peterson, arts/science instructor, was looking for inspiration for this year’s arts/science theme of water, so he drove the Lake Superior Circle Tour: the North Shore, Thunder Bay, Nye, White River, Sault St. Marie, Upper Peninsula and back through Wisconsin. He was truly inspired.

Janika Vandervelde, music instructor, taught a week-long composition camp for students in grades 6-8. The camp is sponsored by the Minneapolis Youth Chorus, a component of the Minnesota Chorale. The camp was held in the music lab at the University of Minnesota School of Music. The students used a variety of music software programs to create a set of compositions for mixed ensembles. Twelve pieces were published into a score booklet (titled “Camp Songs”) which is now available through the [CreateSpace](#) self-publishing platform. The booklet also contains curriculum materials useful for teachers. The compositions can also be heard at janikavandervelde.com.

Another music instructor, **Janice Hunton**, also was at music camp, this one in Atlanta. She was at the Strings Without Boundaries camp, a multi-age (8 to 75) and multi-experience (beginner to professional) workshop that focuses on improvisation and learning by ear. Hunton reports “it was a personal triumph because I played my violin for the first time in 25 years without stress and without having lost too much ground in terms of technique.” She adds that she has come back to Perpich with tools to help string players here adjust to the small ensemble program if their prior experience was in orchestras. She hopes to bring an instructor she met there, Matt Turner, a professor at Lawrence University in Wisconsin, to Perpich to work with students on improvisation.



Dance program partnering with Cowles Center this year

The Perpich dance program is partnering with Cowles Center for the 2014-2015 school year. The first project is a distance learning mentorship program involving Perpich dance students and Dance Place's after-school youth program.

Dance Place is a Washington, D.C.-based nonprofit organization similar to Cowles Center. The after-school program pulls from three D.C. schools. The groups in D.C. and Minneapolis will meet weekly or bi-weekly through technology such as Skype to learn dances together. Perpich students will act as mentors to Dance Place youth and work with them on different topics.

In a second project, the dance students will work with Cowles residency artists through their matinee program and be included in some multi-point residencies with students in schools from greater Minnesota.

Performing and visual arts college fair at University of Minnesota in October

A performing and visual arts fair will allow college-bound students interested in the arts to meet one-on-one with admission representatives from colleges, universities, conservatories, studios, festivals and other educational institutions with specialized programs in the visual and performing arts on Tuesday, Oct. 14, 7-9 p.m., at Coffman Memorial Union on the U of M Twin Cities campus. 


Artsience students will attend Minnesota Social Impact Center launch in St. Paul

The show, "20 for 20: Celebrating Textile Center's 20th Birthday," is up until Oct. 25 in the Textile Center's Joan Mondale Gallery. Included among the 20 is Joshua Homic ('12, visual arts). Homic is a summer camp alumnus of the center and won the center's Project Beltway Fashion Show. He is now an award-winning student designer at the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York City. Perpich wins national grant to support Minnesota teacher evaluation in the arts

Perpich Center for Arts Education will lead one of only 10 state pilot initiatives of Americans for the Arts to develop effective policy work in arts education. The Americans for the Arts' new State Policy Pilot Program (SP3) will provide each state team with customized coaching and technical assistance throughout the three-year pilot via web-based tools and site visits. Each team will receive a direct grant of \$10,000 each year of the three-year pilot program.

Perpich will build its policy work around the new teacher development and evaluation requirements that have been established by the Minnesota legislature. Led by Perpich's senior director of policy, Pam Paulson, Perpich has assembled a core group to manage the state project. In addition to Paulson, the team will include:

Kathy Brynaert, Minnesota state representative (Mankato); Kris Holsen, president of Arts Educators of Minnesota; Greg Keith, director of school support, Minnesota Department of Education; Mary Schaeffe, executive director of Minnesota Music Educators; and Mary Jo Thompson, arts consultant.

The group plans to work with school districts across the state to develop policies and practices that support teacher evaluation in the arts (dance, media, music, theater and visual).

"There is a need to create a process for developing valid and reliable methods of evaluation for teachers and their students' work," says Paulson. "This is a great opportunity for professional development."



Dance alumnus creates work in response to events in Ferguson, Mo.

Darian Johnson ('12 dance) has choreographed a dance, "Be Free" in response to the shooting of an unarmed teenager, Michael Brown, in Missouri earlier this year. The dance is to J.Cole's music, "Be Free." Johnson, who is teaching and performing in San Francisco, added an invitation to other artists to upload their own work in response to the shooting to create dialog about the shooting and race in the U.S. Perpich dance students are responding to the call by choreographing to "Be Free," which they will send to Johnson and perform at Bryant Lake Bowl Oct. 22, as part of the monthly 9X22 Dance/Lab.

Dedication is a special Perpich tradition during which new students, faculty and staff are welcomed to the community, presentations on the meaning of dedication are given by students from each arts area, a member of the faculty/staff chosen by the students makes a brief speech and an alum returns to perform or present.
